

CELEBRATING *Success* DIPLOMA AWARDS 2018



A record year for student achievement as the 'Class of 2018' graduates

More than 70 graduates of the NAFD Diploma in Funeral Arranging & Administration (DipFA), Diploma in Funeral Directing (DipFD) and Certificate in Education gathered with friends and family at Birmingham City University (BCU), in December, to receive their awards and celebrate their achievements. It was the Association's largest-ever cohort of students to graduate at the same time.

The event was held, once again, in the Birmingham City University Business School, and graduates caught up with fellow students, their tutors, members of the NAFD Board of Education and Chief Executive Officer, Jon Levett, as they prepared to receive the awards for which they had worked so hard.

Lynn Fulford, Associate Dean who heads the business school, welcomed the graduates, highlighting the importance of their role in society: "The role of a funeral arranger and funeral director is, without doubt, a role that commands a wide breadth of knowledge and a multitude of abilities, including an exceptional level of interpersonal skills.

"Your roles are unique. Who else can we turn to at a time when one of our own friends or a member of our

Who else can we turn to, to provide a broad service encompassing all of our needs, and who else can we turn to, but true professionals like those of you who are receiving your Diplomas today to organise and to take care of us?

during your period of learning and a day to congratulate you on your professionalism, your commitment and your motivation to educate yourselves ultimately so that you are able to provide an excellent service, to be of help and assistance to the bereaved.”

There was also praise for the tutors and examiners who have played such an important part in the success of the NAFD's qualifications programmes.

Addressing the graduates as she bestowed their Diplomas upon them, NAFD President Abi Pattenden added: “Celebrating your successes with you is a privilege. Today is a day to enjoy and, yes, to celebrate. You can finally relax!

“The long hours of study and completing coursework are over. The exam revision and “Will I remember the answers?” is over. The writing of reflective logs is over. The exam nerves are over. The hours of self doubt are over, and the thoughts of “I should have answered that question another way” are over too. And last, but not least, the nervous wait for the notification of those all-important results is over!

“There is one certainty, which is that most people worry. In your worries you will not have been alone. Your worries prove you are conscientious, that your studies are important to you and that you want to do well.

“One thing I will share with you is that there is no such thing as a typical NAFD graduate. During today's ceremony we have observed a huge diversity of graduates - people at all stages of their careers, employed by an equally diverse range of employers - all of whom are working in funeral service to help care for bereaved people. Despite the demands of their everyday lives, our graduates took a decision to embrace a challenge and chose to study with the National Association of Funeral Directors.

“I'm sure that each graduate has their own story to tell. Behind each graduate there is a support network, which often includes close family and friends, employers, funeral directors qualified as tutors and examiners, other NAFD education staff, peer support groups and study partners. For our graduates, who have juggled study, family life and work, this support group is invaluable in helping to make this balancing act more manageable. Whether it's revision help, a nudge to pick up the learning materials again or taking care of the kids when an assignment deadline is approaching, everyone needs the help of others at some point during their studies. Some graduates will have required extra time or support to help them succeed, while

others may have raced through. That doesn't matter. You have got here. Today is your day to celebrate and for us to acknowledge your success.

Develop your professional skills in 2019

If you are inspired by the success of the 'Class of 2018' why not think about adding an NAFD qualification to your professional achievements?

The Association's two Diploma courses provide comprehensive training for funeral service professionals and are considered the 'gold standard' qualifications for the sector. The Diploma in Funeral Arranging & Administration and the Diploma in Funeral Directing are studied across a period of between 9-15 months (dependent upon the qualification) and are delivered by a team of highly-qualified NAFD approved tutors and assessed by the NAFD Board of Examiners. There are qualified NAFD

tutors based in member funeral businesses across the UK, from Southampton to Dundee, and from Belfast in Northern Ireland to Norwich in the East of England.

With both the Diplomas, graduates are entitled to use a post nominal after their name to indicate their successful completion of the qualification.
